Revised - new edition.

Climatology of Mission Canyon.

Riddell's Plants of Southern California.

This last is a long-term work as you know.

(C) Plans for the director's house to be erected on the Tunnel Road site were studied quite thoroughly

in Situ and when the blue prints are ready a copy will be sent you for your wise and penetrating suggestions.

You would, I feel sure, be please with the turn our garden affairs are taking.

- 1. We all agreed that when the director returns he can undertake a diversified responsibility as he had in the past and consequently that a technical assistant was essential.
- 2. That the scientific publications are essential to the prestige and usefulness of the Garden.
- 3. That the director should have a house.

As the increased payroll and the house are sizeable items it was decided not to embark fipon the plans for another entrance just yet.

Mr. Bullard, Mr. Lancaster, Mr. Wing, Mr. Brodie and Mr. Vivien show real interest and willingness to work.

Van Rensselaer tells me you have written him that Reef Point is developing well and the first publications are nearly ready. Do, my dear, tell me what your program is; you don't have to be told I am sure that everything connected with you and Reef Point is of very special concern to us and you have kept the publication part of this hidden from me!!
