Except his wife, no woman had more influence on Mark Twain's writing than Mrs. Fairbanks, whom he met on the "Innocents Abroad" voyage. During the period which saw Clemens' development from "Wild humorist of the Pacific Slope" to a settled family man and most characteristic American man of letters, he wrote affectionately and amusingly to this Cleveland "Mother." The manuscripts, never before published, have been fully annotated by the Literary Editor of the Mark Twain Estate.
