Mr. Thacher okayed the letters and they have gone out to the schools and the publicity notices to the newspapers. I have made inquiries about paper cups and the cheapest drinking cup we can get is \$15.00 a case of 10,000. I don't think that is excessive, do you? They all seem to be the same price - I mean all dealers quote the same price --.

I hope you are losing all fatigue in your lovely home and catching up on your rest. Please give my kind greetings to all your household.
