She seems to me definitely a little less strained than when I first saw her, but she is obviously anxious about Mr. Bliss, and he seems quite far from well. His colour is not good and he moves slowly as though he were carrying a heavy load.

There were several developments with regard to Mrs. Bliss's sentiments about the Orangery and the drawingroom, which will be well to think over and discuss at some length when I next have the privilege of meeting you and Mr. Sachs. If by any chance, Mr. Sachs should not be in Washington during the days I am to be there, I could stop and see him in Cambridge on my way to or from Bar Harbor.
